TUDOR SAILING CLUB

INFORMATION SHEET

LOCATION

Tudor Sailing Club is located at the north west corner of Langstone Harbour near the head of Broom Channel which gives access to the harbour entrance and thence Spithead and the Solent.

By road the club is approximately half a mile south of the M27/A27 and approached by the A2030 (Eastern Road into Portsmouth), from which the clubhouse is sign posted at the first traffic light controlled junction. Sign post indicates Kendall's Wharf, Outdoor Centre and Tudor SC.

AIMS

The Tudor Sailing Club was founded in 1949 with the object of providing amenities for club members and their boats, to encourage the arts of sailing and seamanship, to promote marine and social events for members and friends.

CHARACTER

Tudor Sailing Club is a 'self help' club with members contributing their individual skills and labour to maintaining and developing the club facilities in order to minimise the cost of our leisure interests. We expect all members to participate in this.

ADMINISTRATION

Management of the club is vested in an Executive Committee, which oversees policy and financial matters. Delegated responsibilities rest with Sailing, Bosuns, Maintenance and Social Committees. Communication includes Ebb & Flow, our quarterly news letter.

FACILITIES

The present purpose built Tudor Clubhouse was first occupied in 1990 having been fitted out from a bare shell by the membership.

The building enjoys views over the environmentally important Langstone Harbour and is well equipped with changing rooms, showers, bar, galley and workshop with car parking adjacent to the clubhouse.

MOORINGS AND COMPOUND

Tudor Sailing Club hold a licence to manage an area between the Eastern Road Bridge and Kendall's Quay, which currently accommodates 100 moorings.

These are drying moorings and best suited to shoal draft craft with either twin or lifting keels.

Subject to approval of hull type and condition, boats up to a maximum length of 10 metres (32'10") are accepted. Power driven planing hulls and multihulls cannot be accepted.

The compound accommodates tenders to boats on club moorings and sailing dinghies. The latter must hold a Portsmouth Yardstick number and be less than 16'6" length overall. Again multihulls are not accepted.

Launching access to low water mark is provided by a slipway enabling dinghies to get afloat at all tidal states although it should be noted that cruisers on moorings will dry out for considerable periods, dependent upon tidal and wind variations.

CLUB ACTIVITIES

DINGHY SECTION

A full calendar of racing, both in-club and inter-club, is organised with Frostbite and Icicle series supplementing the summer period to provide 12 months of sailing activity. This focuses on Sundays but includes Saturday and weekday evening series, plus fun events and cadet training.

CRUISER SECTION

Weekend cruises within the Solent are supplemented by longer cruises in Spring and Summer, including Cross Channel and the West Country. A cruiser racing programme is also featured in the annual calendar.

FISHING SECTION

Competitions are arranged throughout the summer season, both between club members and against other clubs in the area.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

The Social Committee arrange a programme of events throughout the year, such as dinner dance, barn dances, discos, BBQ's and live entertainment. The club bar is open Wednesday and Friday evenings and Sunday lunchtimes, plus at other times to suit the social calendar. The bar is manned by trained volunteers which helps to keep the cost of the drinks to a very low level. Please note that smoking is not permitted within club buildings.

NEW MEMBERS

If what you have read in this information sheet appeals to you, and you feel you would like to take part in one or more of the activities, then come along to one of our New Members Evenings and meet some of the Executive Committee. These Meetings are held on the last Wednesday of each month at 19.30 hrs in the Clubhouse. (There is no December Meeting.)

Your application will then be considered at the next Executive Committee meeting which is held on the third Monday in each month. You will normally be advised of the outcome within seven days of that meeting.

Welfare & Safety of Children and Young Persons taking part in Tudor Sailing Club Activities

Tudor Sailing Club is a voluntary organisation made up of members from a wide range of backgrounds and experience. It relies on the freely given help of its members to organise activities that will be of interest and benefit to the membership as a whole.

As defined within the Club's constitution the term Cadet refers to a child or young person.

Through the use of volunteers, it wishes to encourage the development of skills associated with sailing and other water activities for Cadets. To this aim the volunteers will use their practical knowledge and skills and will exercise reasonable care and precautions in order to minimise the inherent risks associated with sailing and water activities.

However, it is recognised that special regard must be given to safeguarding the welfare of children and young people, who, through their natural trusting, naivety and inexperience, may be vulnerable if adequate supervision is not exercised.

Tudor Sailing Club places this responsibility entirely on the Cadet's own parents or legal guardians. Parents or guardians of cadet members are expected to take parental responsibility whilst their child attends activities organised on behalf of younger members. If a parent is unable to provide this personally then it is their responsibility to ensure that their child is provided with the adequate supervision of a responsible person who is known to them and trusted by them.

Whilst preparing boats, sailing boats or de-rigging boats, Cadets must obey the appointed instructors but once the activity has finished the parent or guardian must assume the normal parental responsibility for the welfare and safety of their child.

There are many hazards associated with sailing and the activities that relate to the operation of a sailing club. The club has published a safety policy that addresses the risks associated with the hazards. It is essential that all members, especially cadets are aware of the risks and how to minimise the chance of accidents or incidents resulting from them.

The club is committed to providing an environment in which members are protected from discrimination and abuse and as Cadets are more vulnerable than adults additional procedures are adopted when appointing volunteer instructors who organise cadet training sessions.

The volunteer organiser of Club Cadet instruction sessions will be formally appointed by the Executive Committee following a formal review of their relevant experience and suitability to instruct children and young people.

If an appointed volunteer is not in attendance when Cadets meet then the Cadet session shall not take place.
